HIV manual another reason to abstain from 'Nobody's Fool'

It's July. Judging from dueling yard signs that dot our city, the attention of many in our community has turned to the Nobody's Fool youth program delivered by Planned Parenthood Waco.

In past years, Pro-Life Waco has challenged Nobody's Fool based on the views of the Planned Parenthood founder, Margaret Sanger: the "It's Perfectly Normal" book given to children at Nobody's Fool in past years; and to various Planned Parenthood websites.

Here, I point to a publication released last January by International Planned Parenthood Federation. The title is "Healthy, Happy and Hot." To appeal to children of the world, IPPF has produced a visually attractive piece with bright colors and silhouettes of youths jumping and dancing in a happy, carefree manner.

The 18-page publication "is a guide for young people living with HIV to help them understand their sexual rights and live healthy, fun, happy and sexually fulfilling lives.

The content is so outrageous it is difficult to share in a family-oriented newspaper. I aim for a PG-13 rating. Keep in mind that the following quotes would be far worse if presented more fully

- "Young people living with HIV may feel that sex is just not an option, but don't worry - many young people living with HIV live healthy, fun, happy and sexually fulfilling lives. You can too, if you want to!
- "Many people think sex is just about . . . intercourse . . . But, there are a lot of different ways to have sex . . . There is no right or wrong way to have sex. Just have fun, ex-

plore and be yourself!"

- "Some countries have laws which say people living with HIV must tell their sexual partner(s) about their status before having sex. . . . These laws violate the rights of people living with HIV."
- "There are many reasons that people do not share their HIV status... They may worry that people will find out something else they have kept secret, like they are using injected drugs, having sex outside of marriage or having sex with people of the same gender. . . . Get involved in advocacy to change laws that violate your rights."
- "Some people have sex when they have been drinking alcohol or using drugs. This is your choice.'

You might question the relevance of "Healthy, Happy and Hot" because the publication is not directly from Planned Parenthood Waco. Planned Parenthood Waco, however, is an affiliate of Planned Parenthood Federation of America, which is in turn an affiliate of IPPF.

Whether local, national or worldwide, Planned Parenthood has the same name and a unified vision. "Healthy, Happy and Hot" is consistent with so many other sources which clearly reveal the Planned Parenthood sexual agenda for children.

The "character" of Planned Parenthood, justifies the message on Pro-Life Waco yard signs: "Just abstain from Nobody's Fool.

Nobody's Fool opponent plays loose with facts

A column in the July 10 Tribune-Herald by John Pisciotta seeks to connect a document published by the International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF) with the local Planned Parenthood's annual event, Nobody's Fool. The IPPF publication is intended to be used in sub-Saharan Africa and other developing countries, where HIV/AIDS rates are epidemic and where the stigma of being HIV positive can be as dangerous as the disease itself. It was not intended for Waco, Texas.

Planned Parenthood of Central Texas' only agenda in Waco is to ensure that quality, comprehensive reproductive health care and education are available to all. At the Nobody's Fool event this Wednesday, we aim to do three things: encourage abstinence, promote parent-child communication and provide medically accurate, age-appropriate information about healthy relationships, responsible decision-making, contraception and disease prevention.

Clearly, the referenced IPPF publication is not age-appropriate for children ages fifth through ninth grades, and it is not one that is distributed at Nobody's Fool or at our four health centers.

Texas teens and pregnancy

Teen pregnancy rates in Central Texas are higher than the state average, which is the highest in the nation, so it's disturbing that anyone would want to prevent teens from getting information about how to prevent pregnancy and

disease. Planned Parenthood encourages teens to stay abstinent while recognizing that someday they will become sexually active. We want to ensure that when that happens, they are prepared.

Planned Parenthood relies on scientific research and facts to help us determine the type of education and information we provide at our health centers and at Nobody's Fool. There is a wealth of data demonstrating the effectiveness of abstinence based comprehensive sex education - the kind taught at Nobody's Fool.

In fact, Baylor University's Michael Sherr, director of the School of Social Work doctoral program, and Preston Dyer, professor emeritus, recently

published a study that evaluated a comprehensive sex education program for minority youths in Miami. Sherr and Dyer found that comprehensive sex education can postpone the age at which young people engage in sexual intercourse and can increase the number of youths who discontinue sexual activity.

Nobody's Fool started 21 years ago in response to calls we received from frantic parents who needed help talking to their kids about sex and other sensitive issues. Parents still need help, and the conversations continue. Not all parents

are prepared or comfortable discussing these issues with their children, and not all children are comfortable approaching their parents. Healthy communication between kids and their parents, guardians or other trusted adults is a key component to any sex education program, and Nobody's Fool helps both kids and their parents start the conversation.

In that spirit, I invite any parent who believes in comprehensive sex education and wants to learn more about Nobody's Fool to reserve a seat at the Nobody's Fool Parent Preview & Dinner at the Waco Convention Center at 6 p.m. Tuesday.
